The City of Stockton and the Stockton Police Department encourages crime prevention and crime reporting, designed to assist community members in recognizing and reporting crime and quality of life issues. *This* calls for all community members to be a part of the solution to crime.

CRIME PREVENTION AND REPORTING

This is a comprehensive prevention approach offered by the Stockton Police Department. By working together, we can help fight crime in our community in the most effective way—before it begins.

Also critical in combating crime is the willingness of our community members to report crime and suspicious activity. Residents of Stockton are often out in the community and have an opportunity to prevent, deter, and report crime.

Residents can report anything suspicious or that puts the community at risk. It may be when a person is engaging or is about to engage in a crime.

Here are some examples: assaults, robbery, narcotics dealing, prostitution, sex offenses, graffiti, vandalism, burglary, theft, reckless driving, illegal vagrancy, aggressive panhandling, open doors of an abandoned building, etc. When reporting, do not place yourself in danger but do give as detailed of a description as possible. We can reduce criminal threats by following the “4 Ds”:

- Deter (anything making a criminal feel at risk)
- Deny (anything making victimization difficult)
- Deceive (anything that makes a criminal unsure)
- Detect (reporting of suspicious activity)

The suspect and vehicle description inserts should assist in obtaining detailed descriptors.

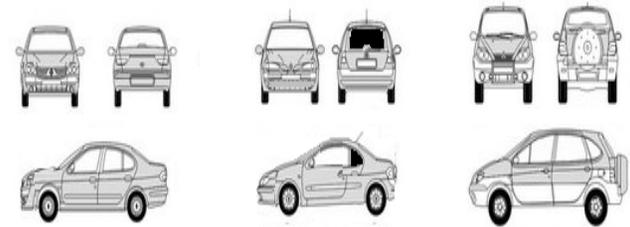
